

MEMO FROM HONOUR SG CHAIRMAN: Sustainability Driven by Honour

Sustainability, as explained on Wikipedia, is a broad policy concept in the global public discourse and is thought to consist of at least three main "dimensions" or "pillars": the environmental, economic, and social dimensions. The discussion of the environmental dimension of sustainability is often centred around prevailing issues. The dominant issues since the early 2000s are, for example, climate change, loss of biodiversity, environmental degradation and pollution, especially plastic pollution.

Wikipedia further describes Sustainability as an "exhausted roadmap" due to the view that our consumer societies are socially and ecologically self-destructive. Moving towards sustainability can involve social challenges such as individual lifestyles and ethical consumerism.

Sustainability is multidimensional in its coverage, but the foundational idea must not be missed; the fundamental concern is the sustainable well-being of human beings. This means being concerned not only about people today but about the well-being of the generations to come. A good approach for assessing multi-dimensional sustainability is to measure the behaviour of companies and nations with respect not just to effective and responsible use and generation of financial capital, but also natural capital, social capital, and human capital.

When it comes to measuring success, it is easy to fall into the trap of focusing on KPIs and checking boxes on rules and regulations, rather than strengthening convictions on the critical need for sustainability. When this happens, minds may be changed but hearts remain unchanged; commitments may be met, but convictions are untouched; rules may be met, but initiative, imagination, innovation, and enterprise are absent.

This is where Sustainability has to become a matter of Honour. Honour stands on its two dimensions of Honouring our Word – being trustworthy – and Honouring Each Other – being people who care for others and are concerned for their continued well-being. Looked at in this manner, Sustainability is the outcome, but Honour is the driving force.

Sustainability, on its own, may well turn out to be a check-the-box and meeting-the-rules exercise. Honour is a concern, conviction, and commitment exercise, which is where we should want Sustainability to be.
